Usually when I walk outside onto the patio, I hear the hammering of the new construction all around me. Sometimes I hear the hum from the traffic or the roar of the motorcycles especially if it's Bike Week (which seems to last much longer than 7 days and comes more than once a year). But today, when I walked outside, I heard birds singing and my cat purring as he stretched on the warm, sun-soaked concrete. It's springtime.

Spring is unassuming in Florida. If I am not paying attention, I miss its arrival. There is no melting snow or crocuses pushing through the frozen earth. There is only the warmer than warm weather with increased humidity and the rising air-conditioning bill to match. I put away my socks in favor of flip flops once again.

My cat will stretch in the sunlight, the birds will sing, and the hibiscus will bloom whether we are worshipping on Zoom or in the pews.

Easter may look different, but resurrection is all around us. May we find comfort and strength in the assurance of God's resurrection and new life in creation and in our hearts.

Good News!!!

In January 2021 Hope UCC applied to UCCFL for a grant. The money we requested was \$2,500. It was to be used to help defray the cost of our extensive new audio/visual equipment purchased in September and October of 2020. The new audio/visual equipment was necessary as we anticipated returning to worship services in our building, and also still wanting to be able to produce a quality virtual service for those folks preferring to attend services via Zoom or live-streamed on Facebook. The new audio/visual equipment allows the Hope UCC to reach so many more people. In February we were notified our grant request was approved and "the check is in the mail."

Justice and Witness Team Update

Greetings to our wonderful friends in the Hope congregation from your Justice and Witness Team.

In spite of the frustration our whole community experiences due to COVID-19 restrictions on gathering together, we have been active and have a few updates to share with you.

The live oak tree that we have been longing to plant on the Hope grounds as an expression of our love for the Mother Earth has at last been planted! Rockledge Gardens delivered a beautiful 30-gallon-sized tree on January 29. A number of our congregants were there to assist and to prayerfully bless the tree. Those with expertise in such matters pronounced the soil to be magnificent, so we are encouraged that the tree will take hold and thrive. Rumor has it (or a source with excellent information?) that the reason for the fertility of the soil in that particular part of Hope's land is the previous existence of a pig farm. Who knew?

We look forward to celebrating the arrival of the tree when we can safely get together, and watching it grow through the seasons.

Our partnership with the Unitarian Universalist Fellowship of Central Brevard continues to bless the students at Cocoa High School and their families through the Cocoa High School Fresh Market. For those new to Hope, here is a brief summary of the Fresh Market and Cocoa High. The high school has over 1700 students, with poverty widespread in the student body. Through a partnership with Second Harvest Food Bank, the Fresh Market provides fresh produce and non-perishable food to the students every Friday during the school year.

The market obtains the produce free of charge and buys the non-perishable food from Second Harvest at 19 cents per pound. The late Mayor of Cocoa, Jake Williams, was the principal driver until his death. Another volunteer has stepped up, but having stand-by volunteers with a pickup truck is of course a good idea. Once a month Second Harvest makes a delivery of the fresh produce.

The school social worker, Katherine Warrick, and a Cocoa High teacher, Arianne Rivera (assisted when possible by her husband Oscar, a social worker at the Viera VA) organize the students to unload the deliveries and set up for distribution. Financial contributions and volunteer drivers are welcomed!

In addition to being supportive of the Fresh Market, Hope volunteered to serve as “The Peanut Butter Church.” We have a bin in the narthex at Hope for the collection of peanut butter whenever we have food drives or other events at the church. Our monthly deliveries to the high school supplement the food provided from Second Harvest, and ensure that the social worker has something to share with hungry students at any time. This month we took 35 jars of peanut butter and 5 “snack packs” to Cocoa High.



Covid Task Force

A Covid Task Force has been formed for Hope UCC. The unfortunate outbreak of Covid with four of our families made us realize that we needed to have some better safety precautions in place regarding the use of our building, with the hope of keeping everyone safe. The Task Force is made up of the Moderator, the Chair of Trustees, and three congregation members experienced in science/biology and current Registered Nursing protocols. With the consultation with Rev. Karen the Task Force will be creating safety protocols and making decisions about when the building needs to be closed and reopened (from a Covid outbreak). As you can imagine it is very heartbreaking to hear when anyone in our church family becomes ill and it is a VERY DIFFICULT decision to make regarding opening/closing our building and it is too much for one person to have to make that decision. Opening/Closing our building has nothing to do with any punitive measures, but it sure feels that way. That is why we prefer to rely on the expertise of science and current nursing protocols and church leadership that this Task Force can bring forth. Most importantly, we want all to be healthy and safe.

Capital Campaign Update

At the end of January 2021, we reached the half-way mark in our capital campaign in time, and have exceeded the half-way mark in contributions.



In July, 2019, our church began a capital campaign called “Raise the Roof,” to replace monies borrowed from our investment fund. Back in July, 2018 we voted to borrow money to replace the roof damaged by Hurricane Irma. We decided to “borrow” \$90,000 to replace the roof, purchase an electronic sign for the front of the church, and replace damaged gutters. We agreed at the 2018 meeting that we would replace what we borrowed by holding a capital campaign.

So we began the campaign in mid-2019 and we took in pledges for a 3-year period. Total pledges were \$85,995.00. We officially began getting contributions from the pledges in August 2019. Since then we have also received contributions from individuals who did not pledge. To update you on the campaign at the 1 ½ year mark, we have received \$51,255. We still have 1 ½ years to go on our campaign pledges and are making great strides toward reaching our goal. If you made a pledge to the capital campaign back in July, 2019, remember that you still have 1 ½ years left to complete your pledge. If you never made a pledge to the campaign, it is never too late. We invite anyone who did not pledge in 2019 to join us in repaying/replacing the funds used for repairing and updating the church facility.



Book Club March 2021



In March, Hope's Book Club will read and discuss Mother Country by Irina Reyn. In this book, Irina Reyn explores what it means to be a mother in a world where you can't be with your child. This mother-daughter story takes readers from Ukraine (1980's to 2015) to New York (2014-2015) and highlights both the post Soviet impact on the Ukrainian population and the ups and downs of being an immigrant.

The main character, Nadia's daily life in south Brooklyn is filled with small indignities: as a senior home attendant, she is always in danger of being fired; as a part-time nanny, she is forced to navigate the demands of her spoiled charge and the preschooler's insecure mother; and as an ethnic Russian, she finds herself feuding with western Ukrainian immigrants who think she is a traitor. Putin speaks of "reunification" of Crimea and Russia. The one reunion Nadia has been waiting for - with her beloved daughter - is delayed by the Department of Homeland Security. But when Nadia finds out that her daughter has lost access to the medicine she needs to survive, she takes matters into her own hands.


Dear Friends:
