

The Reverend's Reflection

"The children are well, yes, all the children are well."

In the prologue of her book, <u>Post Traumatic Slave Syndrome; America's Legacy</u> of Enduring Injury and Healing, Dr. Joy Degruy quotes from a speech by the Rev. Dr. Patrick T. O'Neill at First Parish Unitarian Universalist Church, Framingham, MA.

"Among the most accomplished and fabled tribes in Africa, no tribe was considered to have warriors more fearsome or more intelligent than the mighty Maasai. It is perhaps surprising then to learn the traditional greeting that passed between Maasai warriors. *"Kasserian ingera,"* one would always say to another. It means, "And how are the children?"

It is still the traditional greeting among the Maasai, acknowledging the high value that the Maasai always place on children's well-being. Even warriors with no children of their own would give the traditional answer, "All the children are well." Meaning that peace and safety prevail, the priorities of protecting the young and the powerless are in place, that Maasai society has not forgotten its reason for being, its proper functions and responsibilities. "All the children are well," means that life is good. It means that the daily struggles of existence, even among a poor people, do not preclude proper caring for its young.

I wonder how it might affect our consciousness of our own children's welfare if in our culture we took to greeting each other with this same daily question: "And how are the children?" I wonder if we heard that question and passed it along to each other a dozen times a day, if it would begin to make a difference in the reality of how children are thought of or cared for in this country...I wonder if we could truly say without any hesitation, "The children are well, yes, all the children are well."

Do we value our children's wellbeing in our society? I think all is not well for our children in this country. Not only is child poverty high in our wealthy, developed country, but it does not appear that we make decisions for the benefit of children. A simple safety concept like trying to stop an extremely contagious and deadly viral infection by wearing masks which would protect the most vulnerable among us, is disregarded and turned into a political debate. In the meantime, Covid infections among children are at an all-time high and increasing every day.

And how are the children?

Children should not be hungry or neglected. Any sensible human being would agree with this statement and yet we ignore the children in foster care and cut funding for programs that feed children.

Jesus said, "Let the little children come to me; do not stop them; for it is to such as these that the kingdom of God belongs." What are we leaving to our children? We continue to ignore the threat of global warming and climate change which threatens our very existence. What kind of a world will our children inherit?

And how are the children?

These are all big problems, and I am not suggesting that our little church can solve them. But we can focus our awareness, prayers and actions on children and the vulnerable. In other words, we can follow Jesus and work for the common good over individual gain. As the children thrive, so will the kin-dom of God!

May we always remember, "Kasserian Ingera?"

Church doors re-opened for in person worship July 4, and what makes it even more special is that we can see our friends and families on Zoom at the same time thanks to our technology gurus.

In addition to our wheelbarrow ministry food collection for the Central Brevard Sharing Center, we continue hosting a community food drive throughdrop off one Saturday per month. In July we collected over 300 nonperishable food items and \$85.00 for the CBSC. The next food drop off will be Saturday, August 21 from 9-11 in front of the church.

We are no longer collecting plastic lids as the Brevard County Zoo is no longer accepting them for the Florida Institute of Technology. The county wide collection was very successful. Our church donated over 20 pounds of plastic lids and bottle tops.
