The Reverends Reflection



When do you take your Christmas decorations down?

This week on my morning walk I saw discarded Christmas trees lining the curbs. I also saw people up on ladders taking down the lights that illuminated the roof line. Not at my house. The Christmas season (or Advent and Christmas as we church folk say) is so busy, I barely had time to enjoy our lights. Some traditions demand that the decorations come down before Epiphany or you will have bad luck all year. To avoid the misfortune, you must leave them up until the following Epiphany! Other traditions leave the decorations up until Candlemas on February 2nd. That's more my speed. Candlemas (also spelled Candlemass) is an ancient Christian feast day that commemorates the presentation of Jesus in the temple. It is the 40th day of Christmas and symbolizes the end of the Christmas/Epiphany season. It is based on the account of the presentation of Jesus in Luke 2:22-40. On this feast day, people would bring their candles into the church to be blessed by the priest and then they would burn them all year long in their homes to symbolize the presence of Christ, The Light of the World.

The word Epiphany comes from the Greek word, epiphaneia for appearance or manifestation. It's the Christian Church holiday commemorating the first manifestation of Jesus to the Gentiles, represented by the Magi ("The Three Wise Men", and the manifestation of his divinity, as it occurred at his baptism in the Jordan River and at his first miracle, at the wedding at Cana in Galilee. Although the church has celebrated Epiphany on January 6th for hundreds of years, today the date is infamous for another reason. Last year on January 6th a violent mob descended on The Capital manifesting death and destruction instead of the light, love and peace of Christ.

Epiphany reveals the divine nature of Jesus and the expanse of his ministry of light, love, peace, and justice throughout the world. Regardless of when you take your Christmas decorations down, may the light and love of Christmas and Epiphany shine bright through Candlemas, Lent, Easter and all year long!

10 facts about the Feast of the Epiphany

- 1. The three kings (Melchior, Caspar and Balthazar) represented Europe, Arabia and Africa respectively.
- 2. Hundreds of years ago, roast lamb was traditionally served at Epiphany in honor of Christ and the three kings' visit.
- 3. Whoever finds the small statue of a baby Jesus hidden inside their slice of the Rosca de Reyes throws a party on Candlemas in February.
- 4. In some European countries, children leave their shoes out the night before to be filled with gifts, while others leave straw for the three kings' horses.
- 5. According to Greek Orthodox Church's traditions, a priest will bless the waters by throwing a cross into it as worshippers try to retrieve it.
- 6. In Bulgaria too, Eastern Orthodox priests throw a cross in the sea and the men dive in competing to get to it first.
- 7. In Venice, a traditional regatta that started as a joke in the late 70s has been incorporated in the celebrations of Epiphany Day.
- 8. In Prague, there is a traditional Three Kings swim to commemorate Epiphany at the Vltava River.
- 9. In New York, El Museo del Barrio has celebrated and promoted the Three Kings' Day tradition with an annual parade for more than three decades. Thousands take part in the procession featuring camels, colorful puppets and floats.
- 10. The day's activities involve singing holiday carols called aguinaldos.

Hope UCC Hosting a Blood Drive: February 19, 2022

The Growth & Development Committee has set the first of four blood drives at Hope UCC for 2022 with the OneBlood organization in Rockledge.

The first date is for Saturday February 19, 2022 from 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. The Big Red Bus will be parked in the circle in front of the church. The remaining blood drive dates are: May 28, September 17 and November 12.

<u>Everyone</u> who is eligible is urged to participate! Oneblood staff will determine if you are eligible when you check in. There will even be a "thank you" gift for those donating blood!!

Some basic guidelines to donate: You must be 16 yrs old (with parental permission) or older; you must weigh at least 110 lbs. There are a few instances where a person may not donate and you can find those on the website: one-blood.org

Covid-19 Information:

Oneblood has updated the safety precautions and ALL donors are <u>required to</u> <u>wear a mask</u>. If you don't have a mask, one will be provided for you.

All blood centers are regulated by the FDA and must follow strict guidelines on how they operate. OneBlood meets all FDA guidelines and all team members follow strict safety protocols including:

- All OneBlood phlebotomists wear medical gloves that are changed for each donation.
- All donor-touched areas and equipment are disinfected after every donation. This includes, donor beds, registration tablets, blood-pressure cuff and hemoglobin sensors.
- A sterile collection set is used for every donation.
- Every donor receives a mini-physical that includes a temperature check to ensure donors are healthy and well on the day of donation.
- Only people who are healthy are eligible to donate blood.

Social Distancing at Blood Drive - OneBlood has implemented social distancing safety protocols: Mobile Locations: Only four donors will be permitted on the Big Red Bus at any one time.

Please be aware that Oneblood does NOT test for COVID-19. You should contact your health care provider if you want to be tested.

There is no cost to the church but we are asked to have at least 10 donors committed to donate prior to the blood drive. You may **choose a time-slot** which are at 15-minute intervals, ex. 9:15 a.m., 9:30 a.m., etc. You may register a time slot with oneblood.org or email Betty Capaldo at <u>bcapal-do31@gmail.com</u> or text Betty at 401-323-7041 with your desired donation time.
